City Council Recognizes Fifth Graders for Arbor Day Artwork

At a recent regular council meeting, six fifth grade students from New River Elementary School were recognized for their hand-drawn illustrations depicting the benefits of trees. 70 entries were received in the City's first "I Love Trees Because..." contest. Two winners were chosen from each fifth grade classroom.

Designated a Tree City USA for the second year in a row, the City of Norwalk is home to an urban forest of over 17,000 trees that protect, shade and beautify the community.





Community Comes together to Keep Norwalk Green

On April 19 volunteers from the local Century 21 Real Estate office put their garden gloves on to work alongside City staff.

The group collaborated in a cleanup held along the Foster Greenbelt in front of New River Elementary school. They spruced up the area by picking up trash, raking leaves, and gathering debris.

The following day students from New River Elementary participated in a tree planting project. Fifth graders, with guidance from the City of Norwalk Public Services Department, put in 25 trees before lunchtime.

Fifth grader Angel says, "I think that it's nice that we're having trees and people here to help us plant them."





Their teacher, Ryan Cosgrove tells us, "It's a great memory for them, I had these kids in second grade and they still remember from three years ago when they were bringing the space shuttle. It flew right over our school, this is just another thing similar to that, they will remember beyond just this year."

The students, excited to be part of this experience, learned how important trees are to the environment.

On Saturday, April 30, over 100 volunteers joined in the City of Norwalk's Third Annual Arbor Day event at New River Park. Neighbors, kids, TAP volunteers, and organizations pitched in along with City staff to plant 57 trees.








Norwalk Neighborhood Watch

Announcing Transit Route Modifications



Norwalk Transit System (NTS) introduces Route 7 service between the Norwalk Green Line Station and the El Monte Bus Station, effective June 27, 2016. This service results from NTS assuming operation of the Southern segment of the Metro Line 270 bus route.

NTS Route 7 will serve major transit hubs in the cities of Norwalk and El Monte and will be

a primary public transit service to and from Rio Hondo College.

NTS will also be implementing a modification to Route 1, effective June 26, 2016: The current NTS Route 1 will be revised and will no longer operate north of Rio Hondo College (3rd/Workman and Workman/Don Julian) on weekdays. Currently, Route 1 serves the cities of Bellflower, Norwalk, Santa Fe Springs, Whittier and connects with Rio Hondo College; continuing to the boarder of the City of Industry south of Valley Blvd. on

weekdays. On weekends, the service terminates at Rio Hondo College. NTS will eliminate Route 1 weekday service beyond Rio Hondo College. This area will be serviced by the Foothill Ranch 270 line.

NTS will be implementing a modification to Route 3, effective September 2017: Currently, NTS Route 3 originates at the Whittier Historic Depot (located in Downtown Whittier) traveling




southbound through Santa Fe Springs to 166th Street in Norwalk. Route 3 service will be discontinued between the Whittier Depot and Telegraph/Carmenita due to low ridership.

NTS will also modify Route 4, effective June 26, 2016. NTS will discontinue the last two late evening trips from the Metrolink Station to the Green Line Station (11:00 p.m. and 11:10 p.m.) and from the Green Line Station to the Metrolink Station (11:20 p.m. and 11:30 p.m.).

The Academy's Class of 2016 holds a 100% graduation rate and overall GPA of

save lives by funding groundbreaking cancer research, providing free information and critical services for people with cancer, and supporting education and prevention programs


