


Council and Residents Connect on City Issues

On August 22, City Council engaged with residents at Sanchez Elementary School in the second of a series of quarterly Community Forums.

These informal, town hall-style meetings were developed by City Council to provide for more community involvement and feedback outside of Council meetings at City Hall.

Approximately forty residents attended the forum sharing their thoughts and seeking resolution on issues of concern. Topics regularly brought up by residents included speeding vehicles in neighborhoods, homelessness, public infrastructure and business development. Public Safety Director Carlos Ramos encouraged residents to contact the Department to report speeding or parking violations in their neighborhoods to



improvements, asphalt repairs and playground refurbishments.

City Council informed attending residents that their input was vital to shaping the future of the City,

> and encouraged them to invite their neighbors and friends to future forums.

> Following the event, City staff have begun to contact attendees on specific requests and to determine their assessment of the forum.

> The next Community Forum is scheduled for Tuesday, November 14 at 6 p.m. in the Multi-Purpose Room at Moffitt Elementary School. The forums are scheduled at different locations

Hometown Heroes Banner Program



At the City Council meeting on Tuesday, September 19, City Council voted to reinstate the Hometown Heroes Banner program. The program was created in 2011 to recognize the service and commitment of the brave women and men from Norwalk serving in the armed forces. The banners will be displayed along Imperial Highway and returned to the family/honoree, one year from posting date at a City Council meeting.

The Hometown Heroes Banner program is designed to honor current military personnel who reside in Norwalk, or are a family member of a Norwalk resident. The family member must be immediate (i.e. brother, sister, spouse, parent, grandchild). The honoree must be a member of any branch of the U.S. military services, currently serving on active duty or an active reservist.

Public Safety Myth-Buster:

Noise Disturbances

Did you know that there is a 24-hour loud or disturbing noise ban in effect in the City of Norwalk? Contrary to popular belief, there is no "set time" during which loud music or noise disturbances are allowed in the City. It is unlawful to make any loud, unnecessary noise which disturbs the peace and quiet of the neighborhood. Additionally, the City of Norwalk is able to bill those individuals who are responsible for

loud or unruly assemblages. The Department of Public Safety would like to share with you the following information pertaining to noise

Loud music, noise and/or loud parties violate Norwalk Municipal Code Sections 9.04.100 and 9.04.140 as they disrupt the comfort, peace, or safety of individuals;

If there is a disruption to the public peace, health, or safety, you (if the individual is a minor, the parent/guardian is responsible) are responsible for the cost of Sheriff's personnel who have to respond to your location a second time (and any subsequent time), after you've been warned regarding loud noise;

The costs of Sheriff's personnel will be determined by how many deputies respond to your

> location and how long they are required to be there as a result of the disturbance. Additionally, a 25% fee will be added for administrative costs.

> > Remember to be a good neighbor and be considerate of those living near you. The City has "zero tolerance" for any disturbances of the peace as they relate to loud noise or unruly gatherings.


