The City of Norwalk, home to over 3,400 veterans, appreciates the bravery and dedication of men and women serving the United States Armed Forces.

On Veterans Day, City Council cut the ribbon on a very special parking stall. "Purple Parking" recognizes the sacrifices of soldiers wounded in service through the installation of a reserved space with easy access to facilities. Joining Council was special guest retired Army Specialist Roger Higgins, who served in the Vietnam War where he was exposed to Agent Orange. Mr. Higgins, who suffers from the effects of this exposure, was the first combat wounded veteran to park in the dedicated stall, which has easy access to the City's Freedom Memorial art plaza at City Hall. Purple Parking stalls have also been placed at the Norwalk Senior

Earlier the same week, a resolution was passed supporting the Southeast Area Animal Control Authority's (SEAACA's) "Pets for Troops"

Center and Social Services Center.

City of Norwalk has enhanced this benefit

by offsetting the remaining cost so that Norwalk military members can adopt a SEAACA shelter animal for free, including a six week obedience course to help owner and new pet bond early on. In September, City Council reinstated the Hometown Heroes banner program, which honors active duty and active reservists from Norwalk by displaying a personalized banner along Imperial Highway. The banners are free for qualified applicants. Banners are displayed for one year, and are then taken down and presented to the service person or his or her family at a City Council meeting. Honoring Veterans for Sacrifices, Before & After Service

Eleven foot tall granite monuments etched with the images and stories of bravery and sacrifice served as the backdrop for the City's Veterans

Day Tribute on Saturday, November 11. A crowd of over 200 gathered at the Freedom Memorial to pay homage to men and women of the United States military, past and present. The All City Band performed the National Anthem, the Service Medley and "God Bless America," with the American Legion and Public Safety Combined Color Guard presenting and posting the flags of our country, state, City and local American Legion Post.

Keynote speaker Congresswoman Linda T. Sánchez honored the "unbroken chain of heroes that spans two and a half centuries. Heroes whose sacrifices made our country the symbol of freedom." She also praised the new generation of soldiers, "confronting new and complex threats."

The Congresswoman shared her experiences in the nation's Capitol, moving legislation forward to give veterans with "visible and invisible" wounds the resources they need to transition back into civilian life: a GI Bill modified to transfer the

benefit of fully funded education at any public university or college to a veteran's family member; legislation to speed up the claims process for

> veterans so that they have timely access to deserved services; and legislation lessening the impact of negative credit while serving active duty.

Congresswoman Sánchez spoke of the ongoing selflessness of veterans, who continue to serve the community through volunteerism and inspiration, recognizing local heroes. She recalled Whittier resident Jose Ramos,

who overcame personal struggles to create the Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day campaign, shining the light on soldiers who have long felt unappreciated for their service. John Kelsall of Lakewood established the Jonas Project after the loss of his son in Afghanistan. The Jonas Project gives veterans opportunities and resources to start their own businesses.

Last, the Congresswoman called upon the community to be "grateful for the things we so often take for granted," and give thanks for those who "put themselves in harm's way to protect our ability to be free."

Benefits of LEDs

In 2016, the City completed replacement of more than 3,000 4' fluorescent tube light bulbs with 4' LED bulbs at several City facilities. Now, approximately a year later, the City is realizing approximately 8,460 kilowatt hour (kWh) savings. The savings is equivalent to greenhouse gas emissions from 15,432 miles driven by an average passenger vehicle.

This project was partially funded by an SCE special program that offered cities a rebate as part of the Aliso Canyon outreach project.

The City's commitment to energy savings doesn't stop with facilities. Next time you are at your local park, take a look at the walkway lights. Gerdes, Glazier, Hermosillo, New River, Ramona, Sara Mendez, Vista Verde, and Zimmerman Parks have recently had light fixtures replaced with new, LED energy efficient fixtures.

All nominated properties must comply with City of Norwalk Building Codes.



Street Sweeping: When there is no street sweeping due to a holiday, sweeping will NOT be made up. Streets can only be swept on the posted day.

Trash Collection: When there is no trash collection due to a holiday, trash collection WILL be made up. Trash will be collected the day after the normal collection day for the remainder of the week. For example, Monday's trash will be collected on Tuesday.

Christmas Tree Recycling: Don't forget to put out your trees for recycling on your trash day! From December 26, 2017 through January 13, 2018, Norwalk residents can have their Christmas trees picked up and recycled. Trees will be reused as compost and landfill cover.

Single-family residential customers: Trees will be picked up on the same day as your trash collection. Please place trees out by the curb the night before your trash collection. A separate truck will collect the Christmas trees at a different time than the rest of the trash. If you forget to place your tree on the curb on your regular collection day, please hold off until the following week to do so; trees will only be collected on your trash collection day.

Multi-family dwelling (apartment) customers: Residents of multi-family buildings can recycle their trees by placing them out next to regular trash containers. A separate truck will pick them up.

Guidelines for placing your tree out:

Remove decorations (ornaments, tinsel, lights, etc.). Remove metal and plastic stands. Remove wooden tree stands and dispose as trash. Flocked trees are NOT acceptable and considered trash. Do not place your tree in a bag.

Trees over eight feet need to be cut in half.


