New Norwalk Law Enforcement Team Hits the Ground Running

Please join City Council in welcoming our new special assigned Norwalk Sheriff's Team Leader Lieutenant Noe Garcia. His two new sergeants and team of six deputies will work closely with the Public Safety Department and members of the community to actively address neighborhood and community concerns.

The City selected Lieutenant Garcia for the position because of his ability to understand and embrace the City's comprehensive community policing model. Predicated on his experience with the Sheriff's Department serving several communities in various progressive supervisorial and leadership roles for more



than 27 years, Lieutenant Garcia is a proven law enforcement leader with a record of success working with community members and effectively addressing community policing concerns. Lieutenant Garcia and his new law enforcement team have hit the ground running, working with the City team to establish priorities and develop

strategies to meet the community's immediate law enforcement and public safety needs and expectations. We are confident the commitment of Lieutenant Garcia and his team will be an asset in achieving the public safety goals of our City leaders and our community.





After a lengthy evaluation process of over two years, Norwalk City Councilmembers selected Athens Services as its new service provider at a Special City Council Meeting in April, directing staff to finalize the solid waste franchise agreement. Athens will serve as Norwalk's single solid waste hauler beginning in August.

The new agreement, approved by City Council in May, includes rate reductions for residential customers. Standard residential collection service rates will be \$16.75, a reduction of over 19%. Beginning with August service, rates for senior citizens will decrease 57% to \$4.19. Residents in single family homes will have the ability to prearrange collection of up to five oversized or "bulky" items, such as furniture or electronics, up to 52 times a year, with residents in multi-family dwellings able to call in up to twelve times a year.

Among the enhancements offered by Athens are \$5,000 in scholarships for Norwalk students pursuing college or university education and a 10% discount for Norwalk residents on active military duty and residents who are Los Angeles County Sheriff's deputies or firefighters assigned to Norwalk.

New 4th of July Regulations - Celebrate Responsibly!!

The City of Norwalk wants everyone to enjoy a happy Fourth of July holiday. In order to ensure the safety and enjoyment of all residents and visitors during Independence Day celebrations, we are providing important new fireworks rules and regulations.

Effective May 31, 2018, individuals will be held accountable for the discharge, possession, storage and sales of dangerous (illegal) fireworks on property they own, rent, lease or are in immediate control of. This means that if illegal fireworks are found or used at a residence or property you have control of, you will be considered in violation and subject to fines of up to \$1,500 per violation.

Regulations you should know:

- Only Safe and Sane fireworks may be discharged in Norwalk.
 - No one one shall possess fireworks at any time other than the hours of 10 a.m. July 1 through 10 p.m. July 4
 - Fireworks are prohibited from being discharged on any days other than July 1-4 between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m.
 - Minors under the age of 18 in possession of fireworks and not directly supervised by an adult 21 years of age or older can have those fireworks confiscated by any law enforcement officer, Fire Department employee or adult. Confiscated fireworks must be delivered to the Fire Department within one hour of confiscation.
 - No one shall possess or discharge fireworks on City property, including City parks, streets and sidewalks, unless a permit has been issued.
- Fines for first offenses range from \$500-\$1,500, and subsequent violations can reach \$3,000. The City of Norwalk is committed to ensuring the community's safety and will take a "zero tolerance" approach to any and all violations.







Brighter Lights in Streets & Parks

In keeping with City Council's commitment to the safety of our community, the City will be purchasing approximately 4,000 street light poles from Edison. Ownership will allow the City to retrofit existing high pressure sodium light fixtures to brighter, more efficient LED fixtures throughout Norwalk to provide greater visibility for residents, law enforcement and staff in neighborhoods and City streets. The purchase of the street light poles will be completed within the next two months, and the replacement of light fixtures will begin as soon as the City takes ownership of the poles. City Council approved the purchase of the poles, financing and retrofit to LED fixtures last fall. The overall project will cost approximately \$4.2 million and the City will benefit with significant energy savings on current electricity bills.



NTS Riders to see Electric Buses

On April 5, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) announced that approximately \$264 million in funding would be granted for projects that improve the safety and reliability of America's bus systems and enhance mobility for transit riders across the country. Norwalk Transit System (NTS) has been selected for \$1,206,518 in funding as part of a joint application with the Anaheim Transportation Network (ATN).

NTS' portion of the grant funds will assist in the acquisition of two 40', low floor, zero emission battery electric buses (BEBs), from BYD Bus, to add to its current 33 buses. These new buses are expected to be placed on the road by the end of 2019, to service NTS Route 7, which carries nearly 300,000 passengers annually. Route 7 provides critical connectivity to workplaces and other destinations including the Norwalk Green Line Station, El Monte Bus Station, as well as hospitals, high schools, colleges, and shopping centers. The electric buses come with zero emission technology and a lower maintenance cost compared to the diesel buses.

NTS is dedicated to finding new ways to reduce its carbon footprint by means of electric bus technology.

The event also included activities and face painting for children. West Coast Arborists, Inc. also joined the event, setting up an information

booth on the importance of trees. AY Nursery and Starbucks made generous donations of plants and refreshments. As part of the City's Arbor Day celebration, ASB students from Morrison Elementary School assisted Public Services staff with planting 14 trees in the parkway along Maidstone Avenue on May 10. These students also participated in an "I Love Trees Because..." poster contest depicting the benefits of trees. Volunteers at the Arbor Day event at Sara Mendez Park voted for the top three entries, with winners recognized at the May 15 City Council Meeting.

Career and Technical Training Scholarships

The City of Norwalk knows the importance of education and training in building successful futures. We will be offering scholarships available to assist low income residents with the cost of technical training in health sciences and medical technology or welding/metal fabrication. Training is offered through the Norwalk-La Mirada Adult School (NLMAS) with funding provided by the Community Development Block Grant program. Applications will be available starting June 4 at City Hall, Room 12.

The City will pay for the cost of tuition (class fees). Depending upon the program, the amount of assistance ranges from \$1,000 to \$4,050. The student is responsible for the cost of books, uniforms, background checks, and/or exams. Funding for the program is limited.

To qualify:

- You must be a Norwalk resident. Proof of residency is required.
- You must be 18 years of age or older.
- You must submit a completed application and essay during the City's application period.
- Your total combined household income cannot exceed the following income limits:

New Transfer Procedures & Norwalk Transit System Commemorative TAP Cards

Transfer on 2nd Boarding via TAP Card

Beginning July 15, 2018, transfers between L.A. County Municipal Transit Agencies will be exclusively on the Transit Access Pass (TAP). The new "Transfer on 2nd Boarding" policy eliminates the need for using existing paper transfers for customers transferring between transit agencies. Instead of purchasing paper transfers on the first boarding, customers will need to have a pre-loaded Stored Value TAP card in order to transfer.

Transfer fare will automatically be deducted from the Stored Value TAP Card when boarding a second transit agency's bus within a 2½ hour window from the first boarding. Customers will benefit from faster boardings and will no longer need to carry exact change.
