A MESSAGE FROM YOUR DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY:



The City of Norwalk continues to move forward to enhance public safety for our residents and business community. As part of our annual holiday safety campaign, the Public Safety Department and Norwalk Enforcement Team (Sheriff's Deputies) partnered to provide high visibility patrols

at all our shopping centers in November and December.

The Department has recently hired four additional Officers and an additional four more start employment at the end of January; this will enable us to conduct more proactive patrols to address the quality of life issues that impact Norwalk on a daily basis, including panhandling and transient loitering. The Reserve Officer program recruitment is expanding, with new Reserve Officers beginning training this month.

I'm happy to share that we held our fourth monthly Multi Agency Focus Team meeting, in collaboration with the schools, School Safety, District Attorney's office, Norwalk Sheriff's Station, Probation, Department of Children and Family Services, and Department of Mental Health, with a continued focus on providing intervention services and other resources to our at-risk youth to ensure their success in school while redirecting adverse behavior.

Public Safety continues to work towards developing a partnership with all of our residents. We want to hear from you so we can be responsive to the issues in your neighborhood. Your involvement and continued active support are critical to achieving our common goal of safe, secure neighborhoods.

We encourage you to participate in your Neighborhood Watch Meetings, Neighborhood Block Parties, "Coffee with a Cop" events and other city-sponsored activities. Contact your Department of Public Safety to learn how you can get involved in helping keep your neighborhood and community safe. We hope to see you at our next event, Pizza with a Cop on Wednesday, January 23 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at SoCal Pizza!

Sign up to participate in the 2019 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count in Norwalk!



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Get Involved City Energy Conservation Efforts

The City of Norwalk took several steps throughout 2018 to reduce our energy and water consumption. Light emitting diode (LED) lighting replaced traditional incandescent lights in several parks and City facilities. The lights provide brighter illumination while reducing kilowatt hours. Calsense controllers were installed at some medians, parks and City facilities. Calsense controllers allow staff to monitor irrigation remotely and the flow meter provides additional controls for the overall irrigation. This efficient technology senses watering requirements thereby reducing the use of water. In addition City Hall, Senior Center, Arts and Sports Complex, and the Cultural Arts Center were recently retrofitted with high-efficiency restroom fixtures. In addition, Holifield Park, Norwalk Arts & Sports Complex, Aquatic Center, Sproul Barn, Teen Center, Senior Center, and City Hall Parking Structure also had over 2,200 high-efficiency landscape sprinkler heads installed. These upgrades will help the City reduce water usage by up to 30% annually. Plans for further energy conservation are already in the works for 2019.





The City's Home Improvement Program (HIP) provides financial assistance through grants, rebates and loans to low-income homeowners for home renovations. The program recently provided a 0% interest deferred payment loan to Mr. Espinoza for a full home renovation, including remodeled kitchen and bathroom, refinishing of the original flooring, interior and exterior painting, and new plumbing, electrical, roof, heater, windows, and doors.

Now the home is refurbished, increasing the property value, improving the neighborhood, and





most of all, providing a better quality of life for Mr. Espinoza, who commented that "...the Home Improvement Program is making a profound difference in people's lives by enhancing their physical and mental well-being."



More Electric Buses Coming to NTS

On September 25, 2018, the United States Department of Transportation, through the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), announced that Norwalk Transit System (NTS) would receive funding in the amount of \$986,928 from the FTA's Buses and Bus Facilities Infrastructure Investment Program. This was the second consecutive year of successfully being a recipient of these funds. Previously, NTS received \$1.2 million in funding.

These funds will support the purchase of electric buses and related equipment. NTS will initially acquire two zero emission electric buses in 2019 and two more electric buses in 2020. The new buses will help NTS provide more environmentally friendly and cleaner transportation options to its 1.5 million annual passengers.

These funds are part of diverse funding efforts meant to provide our community with access to safe and reliable public transportation, as well as more modern and efficient bus service.

Tree City USA Community



Trees are an important part of every community. Our streets, parks, playground and yards are lined with trees that create a peaceful, pleasing environment. They increase our quality of life by bringing natural elements into urban settings. Trees in urban areas can deflect the sunlight which reduces the heat island effect caused by pavement and buildings. The leaves on trees absorb and filter the sun's radiant energy, keeping things cool in the summer so that we can gather under the shade they provide during outdoor activities.

Trees also provide shade to landscaping which helps reduce water needs, increases water quality, slows stormwater runoff and helps recharge groundwater and reduce soil erosion.

Trees improve air quality by removing dust and other pollutants like carbon monoxide and they also take in carbon dioxide to produce the oxygen we breathe. The City of Norwalk is proud to be recognized as a Tree City USA community and has established guidelines to support efforts to maintain a healthy and plentiful urban forest as well as increase the tree canopy cover for a greener community.

Only trees meeting the following criteria are considered for removal:

- •Diseased, dying, unstable or dead trees
- •Trees creating major concrete or asphalt damage (sidewalk, curb and gutter) and whose roots cannot be pruned due to affecting the stability of the tree that would result in a safety hazard
- •Outside of the above criteria, trees may be removed if there are other extenuating circumstances that can only be mitigated with removal. Nuisance conditions along relating to tree dropping leaves/seeds and/or fallen branches do not qualify for removal.

All requests for tree removal are reviewed by the City of Norwalk Public Services Department. The City's Trees/Greenscape Supervisor or Tree Trimmer will inspect the tree to make a determination. The requestor will be notified of the City's decision via a door notice and/or a phone call, within 30 working days. In lieu of tree removal, the City may address tree-related complaints/issues by performing trimming services, root pruning, concrete/asphalt repair or replacement when deemed necessary.

Medication Disposal

Expired and unwanted prescription medicines can pose a health and safety hazard to people and the environment. Their ready availability in bathroom cabinets can lead to misuse by children and teenagers, with potential serious consequences, including accidental overdoses. In addition, these items are considered hazardous waste and should never be disposed of in trash cans or toilets as they may contaminate our waterways.

PUBLIC SAFETY CORNER - RIDESHARING -



The popularity and accessibility of ridesharing through Uber, Lyft, etc. is growing. People use ridesharing apps to request drivers to get to the airport, go shopping, and get to and from a night out on the town, and many other destinations. Not worrying about driving in traffic or hunting for a parking space are some perks of ridesharing, but Public Safety would like to remind you to practice the following safety tips when you use this convenient service.

Before Your Ride:

- Review the App. Know what safety features the app provides and how to use them.
- Plan Ahead. Request your ride while inside your location.
 Don't wait until you're outside to request a ridesharing vehicle;
 you may end up waiting longer than you anticipated. Wait inside until your driver has arrived.
- Verify the Vehicle. When your driver arrives, check that the license plate, driver photo and driver name match the information on the app. Never get in a car with someone who claims to be with a ridesharing company if the vehicle and driver do not match the app information. If the driver does not match the driver's photo on the app, cancel that trip and request a new one.
- Share Your Info with a Friend. Let your friends/family know you're on your way; you can share vehicle information through screenshot. Additionally, ridesharing apps provide the option of sharing your location and vehicle information; your friends and family don't have to download the app to see you!

During Your Ride:

- Ride in Back. Sit in the backseat when riding alone. This gives you room to safely exit the vehicle on either side, along with some personal space.
- Wear Your Seatbelt. Safety first. Should the vehicle be involved in a traffic collision, wearing your seatbelt helps reduce injuries. Plus, it's the law.
- Know Your Surroundings. Follow along with the map on the app during the ride to ensure you're headed in the right direction.



- Personal Information. Your contact information is not needed by your driver because they are able to contact you through the app if necessary. Do not tell the driver that they're driving you home; always mention that you're meeting friends.
- Stay Alert. Avoid falling asleep during your ride or becoming intoxicated before riding home. Alcohol impairs judgment and slows your reaction time.
- Protect Yourself. Trust your instinct and use your best judgment when in a ridesharing vehicle. If you're uncomfortable, have the driver stop the car and request another driver. It's a good idea to carry a whistle, a personal alarm, or pepper spray if you are traveling alone. If you're in an emergency situation, call 9-1-1

After Your Ride:

- Never Pay Cash. You can choose to be charged through the ridesharing app, eliminating having to pay your driver directly. Ridesharing apps also provide an option for you to tip your driver, should you wish to do so.
- Give Feedback. You can rate your experience and the driver on the ridesharing app. Be honest; if you had an issue with a rude driver or they made you uncomfortable, share the information. The company can address the issue with the driver and remove them from their services if necessary. Good ridesharing experiences should also be shared.

Recycle Used Oil Filters

On Saturday, January 12,

Norwalk residents who bring their used motor oil filters to AutoZone at 12124 Studebaker Road receive a brand new filter for FREE! Up to two filters, valued at up to \$12 each, may be exchanged at the event, which runs from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Used motor oil may also be recycled, as long as it is properly stored in a clean, uncontaminated container. As part of the City's used oil and filter recycling program, qualified participants also receive a free motor oil change kit, while supplies last. Never dispose of oil or filters, which are considered household hazardous waste, in the trash or down the

Beginning December 26, 2018 through January 16, 2019, Norwalk residents can have their Christmas trees picked up and recycled at no cost. Trees will be reused as compost and landfill cover.

Curbside collection program customers:

As a safety precaution, please place your tree on the curb the day before trash pickup. Trees will be picked up on the same day as your trash collection by a separate truck. If you forget to place your tree on the curb, please wait until the following week to do so; trees will only be collected on your trash collection day.

Multi-family dwelling customers:

Residents of multi-family buildings can recycle their trees by placing them out next to the regular trash containers. A separate truck will pick up the trees.

GUIDELINES FOR PLACING YOUR TREE OUT:

- ▲ Decorations (ornaments, tinsel, lights, etc.) and metal and plastic stands must be removed.
- ▲ Wooden tree stands must be removed and disposed of as trash.
- Flocked trees are NOT acceptable and are considered trash.
- 🋕 Do not place your tree in a bag.
- ▲ Trees over eight feet need to be cut in half.
