Emergency Powers

The City of Norwalk continues to monitor developments regarding Governor Newsom's broad use of his "Emergency Powers."

These actions initiated by the State and implemented by the County have had far reaching effects on our residents.

The City Council has taken a proactive approach to ensuring residents are both informed and protected by these decisions.



n December 6, 2020, representatives of the Metropolitan State Hospital in Norwalk informed City officials that due to a recent need for "surge space" in some of their other facilities, forty-three female patients who have recently tested COVID-negative would be transferred to the annex, formerly known as the California Youth Authority facility on Bloomfield Avenue. City officials were informed that inmates being transferred into the facility have passed a background check. Both the local Sheriff's Department and Metro Police will be responsible for monitoring the facility. City administration has been informed that the use of the facility is temporary, as the Metropolitan State Hospital has no plans to use the facility beyond September 30, 2021.

In November, Governor Newsom announced that counties throughout the state would receive an additional \$62 million in emergency funding to allow homeless individuals to remain in temporary hotel rooms as part of Project Roomkey. Those sheltered were initially slated to be evicted by the end of the year. Due to this influx of resources, Los Angeles County has informed City officials that they plan to extend the Project Roomkey site in Norwalk located at the Saddleback Hotel until June 2021.

At this time, the use of "Emergency Powers" by Governor Newsom has resulted in limited options for cities throughout the state. Attempts to curtail the Governor's over-reach in hopes of maintaining cooperation between state and local government remains an issue before the courts.

A lawsuit currently before the courts filed by Assembly Members James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) and Kevin Kiley (R-Rocklin) against Gov. Newsom continues. On November 13th, Sutter County Judge Sarah Heckman's ruling imposed an injunction on Gov. Newsom, preventing him from issuing executive orders that create new laws. This case is currently under appeal.

Lastly, in a lawsuit by Voices of Milpitas LLC, a group of residents in the Northern California city of Milpitas asked for a temporary restraining, arguing that the hotel conversion in their city into a Project Homekey site would be "devastating to nearby communities" and create problems with public safety and sanitation. A Santa Clara County judge struck down the temporary restraining order, however the case is scheduled for another hearing.

The City will continue to monitor any new developments regarding these issues and inform residents accordingly.

Financial Assistance Available For Our Business Community

The City of Norwalk offers review process relatively quick. financial assistance to businesses for lease/rent/mortgage payments, utilities, supplies to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and/or costs associated with requirements under current health guidelines. The funding is made possible by the CARES Act through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The Economic Recovery Stimulus Program offers up to \$35,000 as a forgivable loan, including a \$10,000 grant option to assist costs in meeting health department guidelines for outdoor business activities. Several businesses in the City have applied and received financial assistance through this program, and indicated the application process is simple and

To date, the City has received a total of 97 applications for funding assistance, and 41 businesses have been awarded funding.

If you're a business owner and apprehensive about completing an application, please note that the application is cost effective when taking into consideration the amount of time needed to complete. Two businesses have received the maximum amount of \$35,000, with the average award amount just under \$8.000.

Ongoing Efforts to Keep Norwalk Clean

Caltrans owned vacant lots throughout the City had become overwrought with debris and weeds. To address this issue, the City partnered with the California Conservation Corps to remove litter, trim landscaping and remove weeds at these lots. Approximately 30 yards of material was removed from the following locations: Adoree Street/San Antonio Drive - south of the I-5 freeway, Firestone Boulevard frontage road between Bloomfield Avenue and Rosecrans Avenue, and two vacant parcels adjacent to the Cultural Arts Center/Norwalk Park on Sproul Street. Caltrans will be invoiced for staff time associated with the project.





Norwalk Supports Businesses!

In a 5-0 motion made by the City Council on December 1, 2020, Norwalk existing and future businesses will now be able to open and make improvements through a process that is described as "cheaper, faster, easier" by John Ramirez, Community Development Director. Through collaborative efforts between the City and Norwalk businesses, the newly adopted code update is aimed at helping businesses with economic recovery amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

Businesses will begin to benefit from the code update beginning January 16th, 2021, which will:

- Enable businesses to open more quickly;
- 2. Initiate a streamlined process to encourage business investment/expansion;
- 3. Create a more user-friendly Code:
- 4. Reduce the need to provide excess parking and avoid costly parking studies;
- 5. Allow for a greater number of signs for businesses; and
- 6. Amend special event requirements to facilitate business events and reduce submittal requirements.

Sustainability Corner

Sustainability is a hot topic. You come across the subject in the news or on your social media. But what is it exactly? Sustainability is based on a simple principle: everything that we need for our survival and well-being depends, either directly or indirectly, on our natural environment, which includes all living species, our climate, weather and natural resources.

We'll be sharing info on sustainability topics, recycling programs and simple changes can make at home and in your daily lives to help protect our environment through our Sustainability

First up, let's talk about organics. Organics include both food scraps and yard debris. About 40% of the material that Californians send to landfills annually is organic waste, and much of that comes from businesses and multifamily complexes. Why should we care? As organics break down, they produce methane, a powerful greenhouse gas. To address the issue, Assembly Bill 1826 Mandatory Organics Recycling, which passed in 2014, requires that businesses and multi-family properties reduce the amount of organic waste going to landfills. Implementation began in 2016 via a phased approach with the largest generators affected first followed by smaller generators up through 2021. Find out how this impacts you in next month's issue!

Christmas Tree Recycling

Norwalk residents can have their Christmas trees recycled up through January 16, 2021. Simply follow these easy guidelines to ensure your tree is collected and reused as compost.

Single-family residential customers:

Place trees by the curb, along with your regular trash containers, the night before your trash collection. A separate truck will collect the Christmas trees at a different time than the rest of your trash. If you forget to place your tree on the curb on your regular collection day, please hold off until the following week to do so; trees will only be collected on your trash collection day.

Multi-family dwelling (apartment) customers:

Place trees next to regular trash containers. A separate truck will pick them up.

Additional guidelines:

Remove decorations (ornaments, tinsel, lights, etc.). Remove metal, plastic and wooden stands. Flocked trees are not acceptable and should be disposed as trash.

Do not place your tree in a bag. Trees over eight feet need to be cut in half.
