On-the-job training starts early over at the Norwalk Outback Steakhouse - students from Thomas B. Moffitt Elementary School went down under for a behind-the-scenes look at the eatery and tried their hand at making Bloomin' Onions, french fries and even learned a thing or two about the Australian Outback thanks to proprietor Rob Cazares.

Teacher Tim Pelonis brings his students every year to tour the facility, which is in walking distance from the school. Outback Steakhouse opened in 1998 and has since grown into one of the cornerstones of casual dining in the city. It serves as an anchor to the city's entertainment center near Norwalk City Hall.
