Rehabilitation of Studebaker Road



On February 17, 2009, President Barack Obama signed the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009. The Act includes over \$2.57 billion for highway transportation projects in California. The City of Norwalk, based on area and population, is scheduled to receive more than \$3.2 million of ARRA funds that can be used for rehabilitation of arterials and local streets in the City.

Included in the FY 2009/10 adopted budget is the proposed rehabilitation of Studebaker Road from Imperial Highway to Alondra Boulevard. Rehabilitation will consist of grinding 2 inches of the existing pavement and overlaying with 2 inches of rubberized asphalt concrete. The project will also replace damaged curb and gutter and construct Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant curb access ramps. The total estimated construction cost is \$2,086,000.


Staff submitted this project as one of the three street rehabilitation projects eligible for ARRA funding. The

request for authorization to proceed with construction was submitted to Caltrans on March 24, 2009 and the environmental document was subsequently approved on May 22, 2009. Federal funds have been obligated and the project is now ready for construction.

Before any of the federal monies can be expended, the City is required to execute a Program Supplement Agreement with the State of California. Program Supplement No. 022-N to Administering Agency-State Agreement for Federal-Aid Projects No. 07-5347R will obligate \$2,086,000 of federal ARRA funds for construction. As stipulated in the agreement, the City has seven years to expend these federal funds.

Currently, a total of \$2,586,000 in ARRA funds have been obligated for the Front Street and Studebaker Road rehabilitation projects. A third project, Firestone Boulevard from Hoxie Avenue to Imperial Highway has

also been approved; however, staff is still waiting for Caltrans and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) to obligate ARRA funds for this project.
