### March 4 "State of the City" to Raise Funds for Local Support Organizations

Annual event provides updates on Norwalk's achievements and challenges, with proceeds going to causes impacting our area.

This year's report on City accomplishments, challenges facing us and what our future holds, presented by the Norwalk Community Coordinating Council, takes place at 11:30 a.m. at Norwalk's Doubletree Hotel, 13111 Sycamore Drive. The Coordinating Council will use proceeds from this fundraising event to support three programs: Fourth District Supervisor Don Knabe's campaign against Child Sex Trafficking; housing Norwalk's homeless families through the work of The Whole Child; and the City's Food Pantry.

City Manager Mike Egan joins the Mayor and City Councilmembers to bring attendees up to speed on Norwalk's progress on its Vision2020 Strategic Plan goals and how "Working the Plan" has helped the City grow in the changing world of technology, efficiency and service.

The event opens at 11:00 a.m. for silent auction viewing. Tickets are on sale through February 28 at nccconline.us.

# Norwalk Sheriff's Arrest Two in Recent Shooting Crimes

At the February 16 Council meeting, Captain Curtis Jensen of the Norwalk Sheriff's Station reported that two arrests had been made in connection with recent criminal activity in the city.

The previous week, a suspect in a shooting at Curtis and King Road and Imperial Highway was tracked and arrested by the Norwalk Sheriff's Station and SWAT team members without incident. The shooting occurred on January 18 at approximately 4:00 p.m., when the driver of a silver sedan pulled over and fired a single shot at two males on the sidewalk, leaving one victim with a leg injury.

In the second arrest, information received by the department led to the apprehension of a shooter who killed one and injured another at Allard Street and Pioneer Boulevard on January 21. A male and female, between the ages of 17 and 25, were shot at several times by a male in a vehicle. Captain Jensen informed Council, "With information received and the collaborative investigation of our Major Crimes Bureau and Homicide Unit, we were able to take this second suspect into custody."

The two January incidents were unrelated and not random shootings by a single perpetrator. The Captain went on to say that serious crimes in Norwalk for 2015 decreased 9% from the prior year, an uncommon statistic, as most cities in the area showed an increase.



Added Note: During the following week, a male suspected of fleeing the scene of a fatality collision was apprehended in Artesia. In October 2015, a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed made a sharp turn onto Curtis and King Road, crashing into a tree and killing the rear passenger. During the investigation, Norwalk Station Detectives identified the driver, leading to his arrest.

School was not Efrain's only focus. Early on, he devoted himself to helping underserved communities gain access to health care. As an undergraduate, Efrain joined Chicanos/Latinos for Community Medicine

> (CCM), an organization providing academic support to aspiring medical students through education and volunteer opportunities.

His current position requires his full attention, but he remains dedicated to helping the youth of today achieve success. Dr. Talamantes co-founded a mentoring organization (mimentor.org), a non-profit online resource whose mission is to inspire the next generation of health care professionals.

# What You Need to Know **About Zika and Mosquitoes**

In response to the concerns raised by the threat of Zika virus, the Greater Los Angeles County Vector Control District reminds residents that, at this time, the virus has not been identified in Los Angeles County mosquitoes.

The virus is transmitted primarily through the bite of infected Aedes mosquitoes, which have been detected in numerous California communities. The mosquitoes can spread the virus by feeding on infected travelers.

"This is a community effort, and we need every resident to do their part," advises Kelly Middleton, Community Affairs Director for the District.

Vector control urges all residents to eliminate eggs and immature stages of the day-biting Aedes mosquitoes. Eliminating them now will greatly reduce our exposure to mosquito bites, and potential infection with imported viruses like Zika, dengue, and chikungunya.

## Celebrating 100 Years in the Community

Past to Present: Asylum to Recovery, the theme for Metropolitan State Hospital's (MSH) recent centennial celebration, recalled 100 years of dedication to mental wellness.

In 1916 the facility, originally called Norwalk State Hospital, opened its doors to 105 patients. Fast forward to today...as MSH serves 750 people with a staff of nearly 1,500.

The hospital has undergone many changes in treatment, as well as technology and

> medical advancement. Dr. Michael Barsom, Executive Director, says, "Much has changed in 100 years, and more change and innovation are anticipated in the near future."

As far as the event itself and reaching this milestone, Dr. Barsom

adds, "It's really heartwarming and amazing to see support from all those who turned out today including retired staff, alumni, and dignitaries. I think it demonstrates how much Metropolitan State Hospital is a part of this community." The campus is Norwalk's fourth largest employer, after the Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District, Cerritos College, and the County Registrar Recorders Office.



Evelia Martinez is one of the many dedicated retired staff members who turned out for the celebration. Serving as Supervising Nurse Coordinator, Evelia worked at MSH for 30 years though her original plan



was to be there for two. Evelia says, "I learned so much from working here. The hospital embraced me with so much knowledge and expertise. If I had to do it all over again looking back, I'd do it in a heartbeat despite all the challenges."

To share the hospital's evolution, a museum was opened to the public on February 16. Volunteers, hospital staff and local university students worked for years to make this possible, and are proud to bring history to life.

# 90-Day Limit on Lights

Following Thanksgiving, residents ring in the holidays by trimming their homes with festive outdoor lights. These decorations create beautiful settings, however, these temporary lights detract from the value of the home and may become frayed and hazardous over time

Residents should be aware that holiday lights may only be displayed for a maximum of 90 days. According to the Electrical Code, temporary wiring and lighting installations may not exceed this time frame. This 90 day limit in enforceable by the City's Code Compliance Division. # **ACEA Awards City for Design of New Firestone Bridge**



On January 28, the American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC) California branch held its 2016 Engineering Excellence Awards Ceremony honoring the year's most out standing accomplishments.

The 30 selected projects received

awards at the level of Commendation, Merit, and Honor, which is the highest level. The City of Norwalk and Biggs Cardosa Associates, the firm that designed the newly constructed Firestone Bridge, received an Honor Award for the bridge replacement spanning the San Gabriel River between the cities of Norwalk and Downey.

Honor Awards were also given to 14 projects that

included the management of the new Levi Stadium's site for (Super Bowl 50) design and construction; design of new \$423 million utility upgrades at LAX airport; and design of the new iconic air traffic control tower for San Francisco airport.



All projects were selected for accomplishments based on uniqueness and innovative applications; future value to the engineering profession; perception by the public; social, economic, and sustainable development

considerations; complexity; and successful fulfillment of client/owner's needs, including schedule and budget.



# Water Conservation Continues through 2016




# New Playground Opens at Glazier Park
